RESEARCH INTERESTS

My research examines power dynamics in International Relations, especially through the study of asymmetrical relationships. My primary empirical focus has been on the international relations of the Americas, often with an historical approach, and on small states. I am PI on the AHRC Standard Grant (c. £250,000, 2021-2025), 'Latin America and the peripheral origins of nineteenth-century international order'. My work is interdisciplinary, especially in its engagement with History, IR, political science and theory, and Latin American studies. I am co-coordinator of the Latin America at Warwick Network, steering committee member of the Global History and Culture Centre, and of the Centre for the Study of Regionalisation and Globalisation.
